FROM THE DESK OF LTCOL J.A.L. FAIRLESS, RFD COMMANDING OFFICER 7 FIELD REGIMENT

As I collect my thoughts to write this article, I reviewed the article I wrote for last years column. In it I mentioned the year started with a rush and it was already August with less than two months to AFX. I obviously don't need to repeat myself but 1993 has mirror imaged 1992.

The Regiment successfully completed AFX 92 at Puckapunyal. Prior to departing for AFX we were issued six Light Gun's in late September. These were in turn issued to 113 Fd Bty in Newcastle because they were the most isolated. The remaining six guns were expected to arrive early October. Unfortunately the Q-system at MLG was in full working order, and nothing was issued.

To ensure 28 Fd Bty would go to AFX with the Light Gun, six guns were drawn from 23 Field Regiment. After signing for these guns my negotiations with the Commanding Officer MLG proved successful. We then had to return the 23 Field Regiment guns and take delivery of the MLG guns. This occurred in the last three days prior to departure. To say it was a hectic period is a definite understatement.

The first week of the exercise was spent on conversion training. The exercise then moved into the Battery training phase for a short period. The exercise was completed with a four day Regimental phase. Prior to departing a Regimental parade was conducted to farewell the M2A2 Howitzer. The 12 Light Guns were deployed in a straight line and a 'Regimental Right' was fired using blank charges. During which a M2A2 was driven through the parade.

The Regiment has been active in many areas. The emphasis has been on individual IET training to ensure that as many personnel especially Gun, Signaller, OPCP and driver trades are trained. This has seen February and March weekends effectively becoming courses camp. These weekends proved very worthwhile not only for students but also for instructors who had not given formal lessons for some time.

We are well advanced in the preparations for AFX-93. This year it will be held at Singleton. We had hoped to be able to use Puckapunyal range again but due to financial constraints no exercises are to occur outside the state.

Finally, I would like to thank the Association for their continuing support. Unfortunately I will be moving on in December but be assured I will actively continue my ties with the Regiment.

STORAGE OF MEDALS

Storing your medals correctly is the most effective and easiest way of preserving them.

Museums keep their artifacts in stable, carefully regulated conditions all year round. The temperature is kept at 20 - 22 degrees and the humidity at 55%. Light levels are kept low to prevent overheating and fading.

At home, the best we can do is to keep medals clean and dry, away from extremes of temperature, humidity and light. The metal of medals can corrode from damp, and the fabric can rot. High temperature and a very dry environment make them brittle and weak.

Medals are best stored in boxes made of wood or acid-free cardboard (ordinary cardboard is acidic and can harm metals and fabrics). Before use, wooden boxes must be completely coated with three coats of polyurethane resin, then left to dry thoroughly so that no odour remains.

Wrap the medals in acid-free tissue paper or well-washed fabric, preferably undyed. Soft cotton and linen fabrics such as sheeting, handkerchiefs or teatowels are suitable, but other fabrics such as velvet should not be used because some contain acidic dyes.

Acid-free tissue paper as well as boxes made of acid-free cardboard are available from specialist suppliers of library or conservation materials.

Handle the medals as little as possible, as acid from your fingers can harm them. We recommend wearing soft cotton gloves (readily available and inexpensive) when handling medals or any precious article.

REGIMENTAL HISTORY/COLLECTION

Once again I report that no progress has been made with the History. This situation is of course due to my heavy involvement with the RAA Association (NSW) Inc. and to the various stresses and strains in the work place over the last year.

The status of the Project is that I have completed a fair draft of about 8500 words which takes the story of the 7th to the return to Australia in 1919. Since commencing the Project six years ago considerable additional data has come to hand and as a consequence much of the draft will require rewriting. Nevertheless the draft in its present form is a formidable reference document and is serving me well in that regard.

For the future I would think that it will take me at least three to four years to complete the project. The property in the manuscript will remain with me and my family. On current prices, private publication of 500 copies would cost something in the vicinity of \$15,000.00.

Referring now to the valuable collection of Memorabilia collected on the initiative of myself. This was offerred to the National Artillery Museum last year, accepted in principle and publicly acknowledged by the Past President of the RAAHS, Col.R.V.McEvoy, in his annual report.

The physical transfer will take place progressively, item by item. The process has been delayed for the reasons stated in the opening paragraph plus reorganisation at the Museum. I am in close communication with the Museum Management.

Naturally, further data is being sought for the History together with items for the collection and I am glad to say that I have not been disappointed. I gratefully acknowledge contributions received from the following:
